### Hartford Foundation Awards More Than \$340,000 in **Grants to Support Food Programs and More Basic Human Needs**

The Hartford Foundation for Public Giving has awarded a total of \$344,575 to 33 nonprofits to provide food and other basic human needs to residents throughout Greater Hartford.

In addition to increasing access to food, these **Basic Human Needs** Emergency Assistance grants address personal care items, utility assistance, emergency transportation, and other items essential to wellbeing. Grants are made using an equity lens, prioritizing nonprofits that serve towns and neighborhoods with a higher percentage of residents living in poverty. Grants ranged from \$3,000 to \$20,000 and

are primarily funded through the **Beatrice Fox Auerbach Foundation Fund** with additional dollars from the Foundation's discretionary funding.

The Foundation awards Emergency Assistance grants twice a year. We are currently accepting applications for the second round of 2024 grants until September 12. Interested nonprofits should visit our Grant Opportunities web page to learn more.

### Video: On the Ground with the Staff of South Park Inn Warming Center



The Hartford Foundation's support of Basic Human Needs seeks to address immediate needs, while also increasing the stability and coordination of service providers over the long term.

Last December, we awarded a \$213,000 grant to South Park Inn to support their "No Freeze" winter warming center on Washington Street in Hartford. The center offers 45 beds for people experiencing homelessness. Inside, case workers connect clients to various supports, with the aim of getting them into long-term shelter. South Park Inn staff work year-round at their main facility, but as winter approaches and temperatures drop, demand increases and their services become even more vital.

## Hartford Public Schools' Back-to-School Event Provides Thousands of Free Backpacks

Roughly 5,000 people came to Dunkin' Park in Hartford last week for Hartford Public Schools' annual back-to-school event and backpack giveaway. More than 20 sponsors, including the Hartford Foundation, contributed to the event. Families received free backpacks, along with other materials and information to help in the upcoming school year.

The Foundation has been a partner in this event for years, providing thousands of backpacks for Hartford students. A dozen members of our staff volunteered at this year's event. It was great to see all the of the Hartford students and their families. We hope everyone has an amazing 2024-25 school year!







### MakerSpaceCT Receives \$350,000 Grant to Support Manufacturing Training for High School Students

Manufacturing accounts for about 160,000 jobs in Connecticut. It's also a pathway to the middle class that does not require a four-year college degree. This can benefit workers of color, who represent a disproportionate share of those without a college diploma.

The Hartford Foundation has awarded a \$350,000 grant to MakerspaceCT to support their Engineering Primer Program, which prepares Greater Hartford high school students for entry level manufacturing and engineering

jobs. Participants gain hands-on experience with state-of-the-art technology, giving them skills that Connecticut companies are seeking. **Learn more**.






# **Angel of Edgewood Receives Grant to Enhance Security Measures**

Earlier this year, Angel of Edgewood's warehouse facility on Franklin Avenue in Hartford was burglarized twice in the span of a week. Thousands of dollars' worth of food. clothing, school supplies and other items earmarked for distribution at food pantries and back-to-school events were stolen substantially hindering the organization's mission. The Hartford Foundation recently awarded a \$30,000 grant for the nonprofit to enhance its security. This will reinforce the warehouse against potential future break-ins, while providing a sense of safety to the employees and volunteers who work day and night in support of Angel of Edgewood's mission.
